

PASTORAL MESSAGE

How many of us are sick and tired of all the accusations and counter accusations throughout the political world? I know I am. What is needed, according to the political pundits, is a consistent standard, the rule of law, which will define the appropriate actions that need to be taken. This, I think, is the crux of the argument. How shall we proceed? Unfortunately for us, there is no precedent for this situation. Fortunately, the life in Christ is much simpler. In fact, God tells us what He wants us to do and how to do it by doing it first Himself. My brothers and sisters in the Lord, let us take a few moments and look at the example that God gave us, see what we can gleam from it and how we can live it.

What did God do? He gave us existence in that He created us. He gave us life by giving us communion with Him that is, to have life and gave us the potential for becoming gods. Man however rejected God, refused communion and thus chooses death to life. Yet God saves us by restoring love. God is love and God is life, so love is life. The opposite is also true. No love is death or no life. How does He save us? By sending Christ who lived with us, preached to us, died for us and resurrected for us. In fact, God works with us to fight the pre-disposition towards evil that we inherited from Adam and helping us to do good. He provides the ability to believe in that which is unseen. Most importantly He shows us that it is possible that He does it all himself first—in person of Jesus Christ.

What does God want from us? He wants to follow commandments, to love God, to love our fellow man and to love nature. We are called to put nothing in front of God. God is the most important relationship we have and unlike the world we put nothing ahead of God. What about money? We are called to give everything to poor. How about our family? We are called to leave mother, father, brother, sister, husband, wife, son or daughter if they try to lead us away from God. What about our notion of self-esteem or self-worth? We find our worth by being God-like and not in world

How can we do it? We start with prayer. Prayer is communication with God that links us to the Church and our fellow man through God. It is a important element to Christian since it makes us realize that there are others besides us. Fasting which restores relationship between body and soul. In fact, it restores relationship with: God, our fellow man and nature. Fasting makes us realize we are not most important things in universe. Holy Communion which brings us into union with God and saints. It not only makes Christ part of us and us part of Christ, but it is defining characteristic of Christian. Communion energizes us. After all this we must give to poor, give to the Church in our stewardship of time, treasure and talents. We feed hungry, visit sick, visit prisoners and above all live the Gospel.

So, we can see that God asks a lot from us. He asks us to follow the commandments. He asks us to keep Him as the most important thing in our lives. He asks us to believe in Him and his message. In other words we must believe in God and not just that God exists. We must also have obedience. This obedience is show even when we might not fully understand why we must do things. For C. S. Lewis a Christian is someone who "...looks round upon a universe from which every trace of God seems to have vanished, and asks why he has been forsaken, and still obeys." We can do all this if and only if we prepare ourselves through prayer, which links us to God, fasting, which puts to death the animal selfishness of ours, and Holy Communion, which energizes us for our work. Let us then do what we need to do to prepare ourselves. Let us go out into the world and act as Christians. Let us make real our faith be doing it so that having treasures in Heaven, we may enter the joy of our Lord. Amen.

The Christmas Fast which begins on November 15, is not like Great and Holy Lent in that fish, wine and oil are permitted (with the exceptions of Wednesday and Friday) until December 12. After December 12, wine and oil are permitted (with the exception of Wednesday and Friday) but fish is no longer permitted. The fast ends following Divine Liturgy on Christmas Day.

Dear St. George Stewards,

As a reminder, the General Assembly is a meeting of all members in good-standing. A member in goodstanding is defined by the Uniform Parish Regulations of the Archdiocese as any person eighteen years of age or older who was baptized according to the rites of the Orthodox Church, or was received into the Orthodox Church by Chrismation, who lives according to the faith and canons of the Orthodox Church, who has met his or her stewardship obligation for 2017 and abides by the Uniform Parish Regulations of the Archdiocese and the bylaws of the Parish. Members in good-standing, in attendance, constitute a quorum of the General Assembly.

A new member may vote in the General Assembly provided that they have been in good-standing at least three (3) months prior to the date of the General Assembly. If you would like to vote on any of the motions made during the General Assembly, you must be present. Absentee ballots will not be counted.



Synaxis of the Archangel Michael & the other Bodiless Powers: Gabriel, Raphael, Uriel, Salaphiel, Jegudiel, & Barachiel (November 8)

All the Angels, according to the Apostle Paul, are ministering spirits, sent forth to minister to them who shall be heirs of salvation - (Heb. 1:14). God set them as overseers of every nation and people, and guides to that which is profitable (Deut. 32:8); and while one Angel is appointed to oversee each nation as a whole, one is also appointed to protect each Christian individually. He commands them to guard them that hope on Him, that nothing should harm them, neither should any evil draw nigh to their dwelling (Ps. 90:10-12). In the Heavens they always behold the face of God, sending up to Him the thrice-holy hymn and interceding with Him in our behalf, seeing they rejoice over one sinner that repents (Esaias 6:2-3; Matt. 18:10; Luke 15:7). In a word, they have served God in so many ways for our benefit, that the pages of Holy Scripture are filled with the histories thereof. It is for these reasons that the Orthodox Catholic Church, wisely honouring these divine ministers, our protectors and guardians, celebrates today the present Synaxis that is, our coming together in assembly for their common feast to chant

their praises, especially for the Archangels Michael and Gabriel, who are mentioned in the Scriptures by name. The name Michael means "Who is like God?" and Gabriel means "God is mighty." The number of Angels is not defined in the divine Scriptures, where Daniel says that thousands of thousands ministered before Him, and ten thousands of ten thousands attended upon Him -(Dan. 7:10). But all of them are divided into nine orders which are called Thrones, Cherubim, Seraphim, Dominions, Powers, Authorities, Principalities, Archangels, and Angels.

John the Merciful, Patriarch of Alexandria (November 12)

Saint John was born in 555 on the island of Cyprus in the city of Amathus; his father, Epiphanius, was a ruler of Cyprus. The Saint was consecrated Archbishop of Alexandria in 608. A man of exemplary uprightness,

in his zeal for Orthodoxy he strove mightily to fight the many heresies among the Christians in Egypt; but above all, he was famous for his singular generosity, humility, and sympathy towards all, especially the poor. His mercy was so great that the report of it reached the Persian invaders of Jerusalem, who desired to see him because of it. Saint John reposed in 619, at the age of sixty-four.

Philip the Apostle (November 12)

This Apostle, one of the Twelve, was from Bethsaida of Galilee, and was a compatriot of Andrew and Peter. He was instructed in the teachings of the Law, and devoted himself to the study of the prophetic books. Therefore, when the Lord Jesus called him to the

dignity of apostleship, he immediately sought out and found Nathanael and said to him, "We have found Him of Whom Moses in the Law and the Prophets did write, Jesus of Nazareth, the son of Joseph" (John 1.45). Having preached Jesus the God-man

throughout many parts of Asia Minor, and having suffered many things for His Name's sake, he was finally crucified upside down in Hierapolis of Phrygia.

Catherine the Great Martyr of Alexandria (November 25)

Saint Catherine, who was from Alexandria, was the daughter of Constas (or Cestus). She was an exceedingly beautiful maiden, most chaste, and illustrious in wealth, lineage, and learning. By her steadfast understanding, she utterly vanquished the passionate and unbridled soul of Maximinus, the tyrant of Alexandria; and by her eloquence, she stopped the mouths of the so-called philosophers who had been gathered to dispute with her. She was crowned with the crown of martyrdom in the year 305.

Her holy relics were taken by Angels to the holy mountain of Sinai, where they were discovered many years later; the famous monastery of Saint Catherine was originally dedicated to the Holy Transfiguration of the Lord and the Burning Bush, but later was dedicated to Saint Catherine. According to the ancient usage, Saints Catherine and Mercurius were celebrated on the 24th of this month, whereas the holy Hieromartyrs Clement of Rome and Peter of Alexandria were celebrated on the 25th. The dates of

the feasts of these Saints were interchanged at the request of the Church and Monastery of Mount Sinai, so that the festival of Saint Catherine, their patron, might be celebrated more festively together with the Apodosis of the Feast of the Entry of the Theotokos. The Slavic Churches, however, commemorate these Saints on their original dates
